Jorgene and I recently received notification that we can no longer park one of our three Jaguars in the driveway of our house. We have done so for many years, but there has been a recent attempt to "tighten" the parking rules within the community. While we can challenge this decision and possibly prevail, we have decided to sell one of the cars. This was made a bit easier by the fact that my daily driver, our '11 XJ, is the outdoor car and subject to frequent coverage of leaves from the very-large Coral trees that line our driveway, numerous bird droppings, and other issues that impact a car that is parked outside (our community does not allow car covers). It is annoying to have to start each day addressing these issues before heading out to work, especially since I like my Jaguars to be as close to spotless as possible while on the road. Since the XJ has to stay in the stable for business and travel reasons (and to provide room for large purchases from Costco!), the next decision was which convertible to put on the block: Jorgene's '01 Roman Bronze XK8 or the '07 Emerald Fire XK. She had picked both, primarily based on their color. In the end, we have opted to part with the XK8, but not without numerous discussions, decisions made and then later changed and then changed back again. The choice was made even harder since I can park one of the convertibles in the community in an outdoor, secure parking area a few blocks from the house. However, given the minimal mileage we put on the XK8, the potential to critters to chew on things when cars are not driven regularly, and similar concerns, we plan to pass the car on to a new owner that will appreciate it as much as we have. But then again, ... This has been difficult, as it always is when we part with one of our Jags, since so many good memories were had buying, driving and maintaining them. It never ceases to amaze me how attached we can become to inanimate objects. Perhaps it reflects the purported comment by Sir William Lyons that "cars are the closest thing to moving art".


The Inland Empire Jaguar Club (IEJC) returned to mile-high Idyllwild for their 4th Annual Jagstravaganza Concours. The festivities started on Friday if you spent the weekend in one of the cabins or themed rooms of the host site, the Idyllwild Inn. Our hosts, IEJC President Mike Zavos and Concours Chair Jennifer Hanson, rented a separate cabin and set it up as a hospitality suite for the weekend. Pretty smart idea. We could come and go in the hospitality suite and not disturb the tenants, mainly because there were none. Devin and I got a really late start, leaving San Diego at 9 pm, but traffic was really light and we arrived a little after 11 pm. Even with such a late arrival, we were in bed before midnight and still got our 8 hours of sleep that night.



The weather was cold Saturday morning and warmed up just as judging started at 10 am, for a perfect day. We parked our frost blue '09 XF next to Dave Allen's Caviar '15 XF. It was one of the few

times I've seen a couple of XF's parked next to each other. Man, they looked good together.



There was a total of 29 Jaguars at the show: 6 from Inland Empire; 14 from San Diego; 7 from Los Angeles; 1 from Central Arizona; and 1 from Southern Arizona. 23 Jaguars were judged: 13 Champion, 7 Driven, and 3 Special. 6 Jaguars were put on display and not judged.

Who was there from San Diego you ask? Well, let me tell you. Marco de la Barrera brought his black XK120; Paul Novak brought his BRG XJ12 VDP; Tom Krefetz brought his gray E-Type; Chuck & Kathy Leuthen brought their blue XK8; Ed, Karen, & Elizabeth Soens brought Elizabeth's white XJ40; Nedra Rummell brought her white F-Type convertible; Craig Wright and Mary Ann Ward brought their gray E-Type; Keichi Yamamoto brought his burgundy XK140; Tim & Debbie Bennett brought their red F-Type coupe; Pete Rieth brought his 1999 XJR; Mike Noren brought his 2003 XJR; Dave, Marie, and Matt Allen brought their light blue XK8 and theie caviar XF; and Dev and I, of course, brought the frost blue XF.

Judging finished a little before 2 pm, so we all gathered around the hospitality cabin for the raffle and then retired to our own cabins to rest before the awards dinner. Some went shopping since there were many specialty shops well within walking distance. Rumor has it Debbie Bennett and Kathy Leuthen were there during the day, but the only people who saw them were various shopkeepers and one boot seller in particular. Debbie and Kathy, be sure to show off that new hat and those new boots at the election luncheon in November.

This year Jennifer again reserved the rear patio of Ferro Italian Restaurant, one of the fanciest restaurants in Idyllwild, for our awards dinner. There was plenty of staff and plenty of servers. We were without want of anything. Forty-two of us attended, filling seven tables. Social hour and appetizers started at 6:00 pm. We munched on Grissini (house-made breadsticks with seasoned butter and olives), Crema Di Fiagioli Bianchi (cannellini bean puree, garlic, lemon juice, crispy radicchio, and crostini), Olive Marinate (assorted olives and spicy pickled vegetables), and Formaggi E Salumi (imported cheeses and cured meats). The temperature dropped dramatically when the sun went down and the restaurant staff fired up the propane patio heaters. I really needed those because, even though I made sure Devin packed warm clothes, I forgot to pack a jacket. I don't mind saying so because I wasn't the only one. Our salads soon arrived (organic greens, tomato, cucumber, and onion, with balsamic vinaigrette) and then we ate dinner and maybe drank some more, but I don't really remember. Oh, I remember drinking, but I don't remember drinking, if you know what I mean. Our entrée choices consisted of Cacio E Pepe (spaghetti with pecorino romano and black pepper), Lasagne Al Cinghiale E Manzo (wild boar, ground beef, ricotta, mozzarella, marinara, and parmesan), and Melanzane Alla Parmigiana E Polenta (lightly breaded eggplant, marinara, mozzarella, parmesan, and polenta). I had the lasagna, which was cooked to perfection. I love my lasagna a bit crispy and that is exactly how it was served.

We finished around 10:00 pm and I left for the cabin soon after. While the awards dinner lasted around three hours, it sure didn't feel like it. While at most events that drag on I say, "Come on, let's go! I'm dying over here," I didn't feel that way at all. I had no idea what time it was when we finished and was actually surprised we had been

there for three hours. I sat between Craig Wright and Betty Friel. While I knew who they were, I didn't really know them. But, after an evening like this, by the end of the evening you will know them by the end of the event.

Sunday morning ten of us SDJC members took the short drive to Cafe Aroma for a farewell breakfast at 10 am. The ten of us included Dave, Marie, & Matt Allen; Chuck & Kathy Leuthen; Tim & Debbie Bennett, Paul Novak; and Devin & Mark Hodges. We ate a wide range of breakfasts from omelets to sausage and egg purgatorio, from buttermilk pancakes to Pesto Benedict, from cinnamon swirl French toast to bacon and Italian sausage grilled with eggs on sourdough toast. We finished a little after 11 am and all headed off the mountain, going our separate ways to our homes.



This year the British Car Day Event was held at the Spanish Landing Park East. We could not get the North Embarcadero Marina Park that we have used for the last two years due to a marathon that was being held at that location. Spanish Landing Park is a beautiful location next to the water with plenty of marinas in view.

The featured marquee this year was the Morgan. There were ten in attendance, included one of the very early three-wheel models and a Morgan chassis with engine in mid restoration. There were 224 British cars registered for the event, with 30 of them being Jaguars. We were well represented.

The Jaguars were divided into 4 classes, JAO, JA1, JA2 and JA3. There had to be 4 entries in a class in order to award a First-Place trophy and 8 entries to award a Second-Place trophy. There were only 3 entries in JAO so no trophy was awarded.



2017 GOODWOOD REVIVAL

SDJC members Will and Maritza Nighswonger were there!

Yes, it's true, my wife Maritza and I attended the 2017 Goodwood Revival meeting in southern England on September 8 & 9, 2017; wow, I can't believe that's been over a month ago! We got home two weeks ago after a tour of Spain; so, we'll have to look at our pictures to really refresh our minds.

As the son of a son of a mechanic, I was born with a wrench in my hand and I've been a car guy all my life. So, of course, I've been watching the car shows for years; "Chasing Classic Cars" is, of course, a top favorite. The Goodwood Revival has been featured many times and it looked like great fun. So, as Maritza and I were thinking of taking a vacation trip, the Goodwood Revival came into focus as our point of departure for trip planning.

To cut to the chase, everything you've seen and heard about the Goodwood Revival is true and the experience is unforgettable. The Monterey Historic's are terrific, but pale in comparison to the Revival. It's all about cars and times, mostly from 1947 but no later than 1967, and a harking to those simpler days and times. Truly, everyone dresses in period clothing and style. There are hundreds of vendors in booths and car parks full of vintage hobby cars. Before you swoon into the dream, please note that smart phones were present and distracting as ever, despite their seeming unauthenticity.

My little word-smith bit here does not attempt to illustrate the glory of the Goodwood Revival; for that please see the numerous commercial and on-line documentaries, that will get your juices going. Here, I want to give a few bits of logistic information to help my fellow enthusiasts as you set out on your own Goodwood adventure.

Talking with friends and fellow club members, particularly LA club member Rodger Wyatt and his lovely wife Rebecca, we learned that tickets sell out early for the Revival so we needed to set the date. I believe that I purchased the Revival tickets October 2016 and made the room reversions shortly thereafter. Hence the dye was cast.

OK, let's set the stage: I was born and raised in Southern California and while 12 of the 28 cars I've owned have been British, I really didn't have a clue about England. But how bad could it be? Maybe

after owning two right-hand drive Lotus cars, I'd get the idea of left-side driving pretty quickly (in reality, right turns were really a disaster; thank God, no bodywork was involved, and the manual shift on the left side was an additional challenge).

So much for obvious trip planning incompetency. Booking our room almost a year out (and with the first trip bookings; I was trying to be frugal) the most reasonable closest room to Goodwood was 25 miles away. I looked on the map and it was a straight shot; no big deal only a ½ hour away. Well, way wrong!

TIP: Book very early and get as close as you can reasonably afford to Goodwood; splurge here!

OK, so a year tip-toes by and we're getting on the Norwegian Air flight to Gatwick, England; fly 11 hours, collect the bags and rent a 4-cylinder, 6-speed manual Nissan (I had an electric lawnmower with more torque), but with built-in GPS! And we headed out on the road. First turn out of the rental cars lot I turned the wrong way; didn't die but heard the first of many English horns. So, Goggle says 2 hours southwest to Alton, our base for the Goodwood events, and shows a straight-line road. Well not so much; do you know about roundabouts? No such thing as a 4-way intersection in UK (Spain pretty much as well), it's all handled by a clockwise circle, which you merge on to then peel off in the direction you want to go and become dizzy in the process, about the time the GPS sends you back through again since you counted the exits wrong.

TIP: GPS is an absolute MUST!!

So, off we went. The highways were somewhat narrower, but easy enough; then it's off on the local roads, narrow with occasional lane road blocks just for fun. Got to Alton and had a memorable pub dinner of fish-pot pie and a beer.

Jaguar is printable news in England, as its largest domestic auto producer. The Friday morning paper

reported that Jaguar is on track to deliver lots of electric cars in 2018. Jaguar was also calling for the country to be ready with the necessary infrastructure to meet this demand.

So, Friday morning we set out for Goodwood, some 25 miles away, and quickly discovered a couple of things: English 'B' roads and English weather (remember the So. Cal. part?). The quick ½-hour drive to Goodwood was in and out of rain and took more or less 2 hours, and was a lot of work. When we finally arrived, there was a bit of a queue into the car park, which the day before had been a sheep grazing area, with evidence and all (not a So. Cal. tarmac.) The rain was already developing lots of mud. Our So. Cal. \$5 compact umbrella did manage to barely last long enough to make it to the first vendors we saw with real UK umbrellas (hauled that "brolly" thru 90-degree weather in Spain). We were dressed to the '60s Tee, but Maritza's red high heels were no fun for her. Hard to find a dry place to eat our breky-burgers.

TIP: Bring appropriate walking shoes; rubber boots might be an idea.


We proceeded to investigate the huge Goodwood venue; the track alone is 2.38 miles. We found a viewing spot on the start/finish straight to view the Ecurie Ecosse Parade. This was a Scottish privateer racing team from the 1950s that campaigned mostly Jaguars and went on to win Le Mans victories twice in 1956 and 1957 in D-jags prior to factory entries. They have maintained their stable and took spirited laps to the crowd's delight. Beautiful cars and that memorable sound of the twin-cam straight 6 engines at speed really expands your chest; a beautiful note!

We moved around the circuit via the vintage tractor- drawn spectator wagons. We found a fence to look over as practice for Saturday's racing progressed. We saw several of the practice sessions, including the hard pushing MK I's and MK II's that sped by; there it was again, that twincam snarl! Essentially, everything you can think of, pre-1967 and a bunch of stuff you've never seen or heard of, was out on the track. The '60s Formula cars were really a thrill! And the kids peddle car race was a joy to watch.

If you frequent the travel pages, you'll have seen the articles on "the Brochure versus the Reality". The Revival looks a lot less crowded on "Chasing Classic Cars"; it's very crowded; oceans of tweed and slow moving, usually distracted English folks, mostly with a beer in hand, that are able to block an 8' sidewalk with just one couple. And it rained, still we tried to check it all out, hard work (I hate crowds!). But alas, we hiked back through the mud to the car around 6PM. Got to the Hotel around 8 pm and had a nice dinner.



Saturday, up early (for us) breakfast and off to the Revival. Traffic was much worse, although interesting; got there around 11:30 AM. It was crowded such that we can't see the venue, raining on and off. We found seats in the grandstands and watched the racers dice it up and they did go after it! There were lots of different classes, with races of

about 13 laps each. Finally, in the late afternoon, we wandered off into the paddocks, museums and vintage war birds; there we had a great time.



The paddocks were wide open and it was great fun to see the cars we'd watched earlier. We got to see the Ecurie Ecosse team car up close; it was better than our local concours events if only for the vintage patina. By the time we slogged through the mud to the car it was dark and then had a 1- hour wait to get to the road; hotel after 8:30 pm, dining room closed; dinner was from a convenience store: meat, cheese and crackers.



On Sunday, Maritza was clearly tired, but still a trooper for Goodwood; but with a 2-hour drive to get back to Goodwood, huge crowds, mud and a 2-hour drive back before driving on an additional 1½ hours to Bath for the night; it seemed too much! In retrospect, it was a good call to pass on back to Goodwood for Sunday and Bath was an exceptionally special experience.







Notes from the Judges Tent

This month's article, unlike my usual columns, takes advantage of the interregnum between wind-down of the 2017 Concours season and spin-up of the 2018 season to wander along other lanes.

Factoid from AUTOWEEK Magazine (18 SEPT 17): The new addition to the Range Rover lineup, the Velar, is derived from an "F-Pace, which was stripped down to its bare essentials and then built back up in the image of a Land Rover" to close a product line gap between the RR Evoque and the RR Sport.

Other Lanes. Dan Jensen's musings in his October Tracks column got me thinking about how a Jaguar began my journey toward the CJ Tent.

While nearing retirement from active duty at Ft. Monmouth NJ in 1993, I often passed a forlorn, gray saloon in a suburban driveway. On a whim, I stopped for a closer look, saw copious rust and dingy chrome, then the original red interior and glorious, though neglected wood, of a 1960 Mark IX. After some negotiations liberally lubricated by wishful thinking, I agreed to \$4500 purchase IF the owner could deliver it under its own power to our home a few miles away. He did – no brakes, no lights, 5 working cylinders. Wisely shipping, rather than driving it to our new home in San Diego, the summer of '93 included not only joining SDJC, but learning skills such as fabrication of stainless brake lines, solving myriad Lucas issues, repairing broken leaf springs, restoring woodwork including milling new foundation pieces and repairing veneers, and more. Along the way, I met (and continue to meet) several colorful and talented enthusiasts – including a NJ fellow who had converted his father's chicken farm to British parts and machine shop facilities and provided replacements for my missing intake plumbing, another Easterner whose entire home was walled with SU carb bits & pieces, a retired JHU APL engineer (and JCNA Judge) in Tustin & his Apache wife whose two adjacent homes were dedicated to fabrication and storage of 'unobtainium' parts for Jaguars, and Tracy Hazelton (our former President) whose memorable quote "Sometimes you need a bigger hammer" still rings true.

Once up and running, following massive body work, an engine rebuild, a year of down time due to a blown power steering pump, and a misadventure on Poway road involving a red-hot starting carb and an engine compartment filled with an extinguisher load of Purple K (look it up if you want to appreciate what a mess that made!), there were times to enjoy Space, Grace and Pace before the Gray Whale was sold to a fellow in Casas Grande, AZ in 1997. There were many lessons learned along the way, and lots of "entertainment tax" as one might term it, as well as many lasting memories, and good friends found.
